PROTECTION OF THE THEOTOKOS; ROMANOS THE MELODIST

EPISTLE READING OF THE DAY: This morning's Apostolic Reading is from the Second Letter of St. Paul to the Corinthians, Chapter 6, Verses 16-18, Chapter 7, Verse 1. It is found in our books on page 116.

Today's *Apolytikion* (Dismissal Hymn) is that of Tone Eight (Plagal Four): Descending from on high, O merciful Lord, for us did You endure three days in the tomb, that we may be released from the passions of this world, You who are our Resurrection and our Life, Lord, glory to You.

OIKOS LECTURE NEXT SUNDAY: In lieu of a sermon next Sunday, October 8, we will have the pleasure of welcoming **Steven Harris**, **Ph.D**. A member of the Serbian Orthodox Parish of the Most Holy Theotokos, in Irvine, CA, Dr. Harris holds a Ph.D. in Psychology. He is Director of the Center for Depth Psychology in Newport Beach, CA. and also serves as Associate Professor of Psychology and Family Therapy at the California Graduate Institute in Orange, CA. He will be speaking to us on matters that pertain to our overall well-being and spiritual growth.

HONORING PATRICIA ALECK DECEMBER 3: It is customary for the immediate past president of the Ladies Philoptochos to be honored, at the conclusion of her service as President (as it is also custom for the immediate past president of the Parish Council to be so honored). Our Ladies Philoptochos will honor Pat with a pre-Christmas fête, on Sunday, December 3. As we will be in the preparation period for the great feast of the Nativity of our Lord, the hall will be "dressed up" for Christmas. The theme of the event is JOY. Joy as we prepare to celebrate Christmas. Joy as we celebrate the spirit of service and generosity, which Pat embodies. Her love for her Church and her life-long dedication to the Cathedral—as Parish Council member, as Stewardship chair, as Parish Council President, as Philoptohcos member and as Philoptohcos President. WE CAN'T WAIT FOR IT TO FINISH: However, with the current building boom in San Francisco, the Contractor is having trouble getting subs to do the work. We're in the home stretch, though. As you see, we are nearing completion of the exterior. We are also about a month away from receiving a Conditional Use Permit to enable us to secure a third-party operator to run the parking. As for the interior: we hope to begin the upper wall installation by the end of 2017. However, in order for us to continue, we need your prayers and your continued financial support. First, we have outstanding pledges, to the tune of \$600,000. Statements went out last week. Follow-up phone calls have been made by members of the Parish Council. May we ask you to make good on your Building Fund pledges by the end of 2017? Please give serious consideration to doing so, to enable us to continue rebuilding the Cathedral. If you have not yet contributed, won't you consider making a gift this calendar year? We invite you to join in and let's finish what we've undertaken to do, that is, to rebuild our church and make firm our presence as a Greek Orthodox house of worship in the *heart of* our Great City. In this way, we will be answering the call by God to Moses, when he said "Build me a Sanctuary, and I will appear among you." (from the Septuagint: Kai ποιήσεις μοι άγίασμα, καὶ ὀφθήσομαι ἐν ὑμῖν). (Exodus 25:8). When everything is completed, we will be able to consecrate the new Cathedral to the glory of God. More than likely, this will take place to coincide with our 100th anniversary, in 2021. Let's keep going, Annunciation!
