Philopotchos Elects new board, officers; Takes Oath of Office, Donates \$70,000 more to the Building Fund

On Pentecost Sunday, the Annunciation Cathedral Ladies Philoptochos met, elected a new Board for 2017-2019 and also elected new officers. The Board received its oath of office on Father's Day, June 18, at which time Pat Aleck presented an additional check to the Building Fund, on behalf of Philoptochos, in the amount of \$70,000., for a total of \$267,500. to the Capital Campaign, towards the new Cathedral. In the earlier campaign to rebuild the ancillary facilities, following the 1989 Earthquake, Philoptochos led the way by donating 1.25 million, thus being named "Cathedral Founder".

We congratulate Philoptochos for its ongoing support, not only of the Cathedral's building program, but of its many ministries, as well as the ministries of the Metropolis and the Archdiocese, ministries such as Kids 'n Cancer, the Bishop Anthony Endowment Fund in support of our seminarians, cardiac programs, educational programs, St. Basil's Academy and others, just to name a few. The Philoptohcos is inspired by faith and is an example to all. People with a heart get things done! And our Philopotchos has a huge heart!

Looking Ahead to our Greek Food Festival, 2017

As announced, our Festival will take place on our grounds at 245 Valencia Street, San Francisco, Friday, September 22, Saturday, September 23 and Sunday, September 24. Food preparation has begun and festival post cards, sponsorship forms, and festival book contract forms for placing ads have all gone out. By now, those who placed an ad in our 2016 Festival book have responded, in most cases renewing their ads. We are grateful for your support of the Festival Book, as it brings in HALF of the revenue of the Festival itself! (Thanks to you and to the efforts of Angie Leventis and Presbytera Aliki.) We are also grateful for your sponsorship support, which helps underwrite the cost of the ingredients used for the food. Last year, within two weeks, all of the food items were underwritten! One new feature this year is that we expect to have full use of the courtyard, so people can mingle outdoors. The outdoor space encircles the new Cathedral. Eventually, we will a variety of plants and shrubs around the perimeter. Eventually, as well, we will have an outdoor fountain, with water cascading over the central bowl, supported by "Theodosian" columns, and onto the mosaic floor, evocative of the Stobi baptistery. (We've written about the mosaics in previous issues of the Herald.)

Also, new this year is an intensified advertising campaign, including better utilization of our web site, Facebook, and street signs. Our goal is to reach 10,000 people. Meanwhile, we will be featuring our old favorites: gyros and lamb (again, thank you, George Gavros), loukoumades (thank you, Ambus family and Soteria), and glyka (thank you, Philoptochos ladies), even as we streamline our operations, thank you, Genie Mantzoros and Mauna Arnzen. And dance we will.

We hope to do that on the courtyard, where one of our tavernas will be stationed, thanks again, Nick Svetcoff. Thanks, as well, to the behind the scenes, hardworking volunteers — Manoli Pappas, who secures the permits, Maria Allen, who

coordinates the volunteers, Nick Balian, who designs the graphics, Larry, Joseph, and Tom Moulas, who take care of set-up and clean-up, and, of course, the executive committee of the Parish Council, who are this year's chairs, along with the incredible assistance of Tessie Calligeros, Deno Konstantinidis and Grace Koutoulas, and many more.

Haralambos Fragakis Named 2017 Father of the Year

Haralambos (Bobby) Fragakis was born on April 12, 1945 in the village of Fourne in Hania, Crete. He is the second youngest from a large family of eight kids. When he was sixteen years old, he decided to quit high school and began working on cargo ships so he can help his family.

When Bobby was twenty years old, he served in the Greek Army's Paratrooper Raider Forces, also known as "Dyna-



meis Katadromon" for a little over two years. Even though he was in the army, he still continued to assist his family. As a paratrooper, the army would compensate him for each jump he accomplished. He risked his life twenty-two times.

In the meantime, Bobby's older siblings immigrated to Montreal, Canada for a better life. They invited him and their youngest sister to move there once Bobby completed his army services. Once he moved to Montreal, he learned the craft of baking Greek desserts, working by his brother-in-law's side in his bakery.

Bobby moved to Dayton, Ohio in 1973 and opened up his own bakery. Three years later, while still living in Ohio, he met the love of his life, Marianthe Loukoumides. They were married in July 1976 and had their first child, Androniki, in September 1977.

With his family, they went on vacation to San Francisco in 1977 to visit Bobby's brother, John Fragakis. They fell in love with San Francisco and, upon their return to Ohio, Bobby sold his bakery and they decided to start their new life in San Francisco. His brother and his Sibethero, Mike Nicolas, owned Bel Clift Market and employed Bobby. In May 1979, Bobby and Marianthe welcomed their second child, Natalia.

Ten years later, Bobby purchased Mike's half of the business when he retired. And a few times after that, his brother retired, and Bobby purchased his brother's share, making them full owners. After working hard for twenty years together, Bobby and Marianthe decided to sell the business and retire themselves.

Bobby is now enjoying his retirement with his wife and grandchildren—Basile, Haralambos, Christoforos, and Ioannis. He loves watching all types of sports, from his beloved Giants, Warriors and 49ers, all the way to wrestling and soccer. He is able to devote more time to our church and assist the Philoptochos with whatever assistance they need and also loves traveling to Greece as much as possible.


Building Update: Keep Looking Up!

Cornerstone to be Installed This Month For Sure

Back in 1997, His All Holiness Ecumenical Patriarch Bartholomew broke ground for the new Cathedral and lay the cornerstone. Early in May, almost 20 years later, the construction workers will lay this stone on the exact spot where the ground breaking took place. Recall, the ground breaking took place just below the old courtyard, adjacent an evergreen. In the new configuration, the spot is on the courtyard, as one exits the north doors of the Cathedral.



Developing a Needs List: 2 Parishioners Step Up

Two parishioners, to date, have volunteered to join a committee to develop a needs list for the new Cathedral. The needs have been, for the most part, defined. They consist of all the appointments of the interior, as the light fixtures, the iconostasion, all the icons, the pangari, the icon stands, pulpit, bishops thrones, altar table, pews, and the like. All these are drawn in the construction set of the architectural drawings. In addition, things like chalices and other sacred vessels, altar covers, and altar servers' robes will be needed. The committee will consider all these items and create a brochure which will be distributed and which will offer numerous donor possibilities. As we begin work on the interior, we will be looking for donations for the specific items needed.

Our Architect has identified about 100 items, consisting of the above items, and also including doors, hanging lamps, baptismal fountains (for infants and also for adults), court-yard fountain mosaics, pews, pulpit, bishop's thrones, icon screen, soleas mosaic, sound system, organ, and on and on. Then, there is the iconography, including the main dome, the pendentives, the platytera, prothesis, diakonikon, iconostasion icons, narthex icons, occasional, portable icons, not to mention chalices, altar coverings, censers, and the like.

Wherever possible, the needs list will include photographs or renderings, along with a description of each item and the donation for each item. If you have already contributed to the Capital Campaign, and wish to donate a specific item, in addition, your name on the donor wall will reflect your TOTAL giving. If you have not yet contributed to the Capital Campaign, this will be an opportunity for you to be a part of this unique undertaking—the building of a church, and what a church! A Cathedral, poised to serve generations of faithful to come, in the heart of one of the most vibrant cities in the world. You will be remembered for your generosity by your children and their children-all who will come after you. More especially, you will be remembered by Him, whom we beseech to "remember the founders and benefactors of His holy Church." If you would like to serve on the Needs Committee, please let Tom Nuris or Father Stephen know. The more involvement we have from our parishioners, the better. We are, after all, rebuilding the Cathedral, all together.

Parking: Just a Few Days to Go

Parking for up to 70 cars has been available in the lot behind the Cathedral, at 334 14th Street and on the street. Stewards of the Cathedral are charged only \$5 to park, by showing their discount card; the Cathedral picks up \$7 of the parking cost for Stewards.

This parking arrangement with the lot behind the Cathedral is about to end, as our own parking structure gets up and running. As previously noted, we intend to have a third-party operator run our lot, which will be available to the

public when not in use by the church. For this, a conditional use permit is required. We are waiting for approval from the City Planning Department, to enable us to proceed. This is the second of four steps we need to take before we are able to access the parking component. The third step is the installation of the elevator, which has, at last, occurred. We are now waiting for the appropriate inspection, the installation of gates and the finalization of a clear path of travel. Just a few days to go! Can't wait.

I would like to give, but I don't have much to give.

Some people may be able to make a one-time gift. Others may not. Some people pledge an amount and then pay on their pledge over five years. It adds up. If you think about it, small amounts add up and become big amounts. Take a cup of coffee. Not the fancy stuff. A simple cup. Typically, a plain cup costs \$2. If you can put aside the equivalent of a cup of coffee every day, that comes to about \$730 a year. Do the math. In 5 years, that's \$3,650!

The chart below shows how, by thinking in terms of a per person/per day gift of a few dollars and cents, one can make a meaningful gift over a 5-year period. Consider how you may become a part of this awesome undertaking of rebuilding the Cathedral. By doing so, you may also save on your

taxes, as every cent given to the Building Fund is fully taxdeductible, to the extent allowed by law. And, every gift totaling \$1,000 or more will be acknowledged on the donor wall which, will be placed in the new Cathedral.

The Dormition of the Theotokos

One of the major feasts in the Orthodox Church has to do with the Theotokos, the Ever-Virgin Mary, Mother of our Lord. It is the feast of the Dormition, or her "falling asleep." Some people refer to this event as the "assumption," because they hold that Mary was bodily assumed into heaven, as our Lord was. Although Orthodox generally hold this view, it is not a dogma in the Orthodox Church. That is, it is not an "article of faith," necessary for us to believe. Nevertheless, the event is an occasion for us to show our deep reverence for Mary, as we do on a number of other occasions: her nativity (September 8), her presentation to the Temple (November 21), her "purification, the entry of our Lord to the Temple (February 2), and her Annunciation (March 25). Special services are held on August 15, the feast of the Dormition. At the Cathedral, Orthros will be held at 9 a.m., followed by the Divine Liturgy at 10 a.m., and luncheon afterwards, offered by the Ladies Philoptochos. Meanwhile, the Paraklesis service will be offered, whereby we beseech the Mother of God for her intercession, that our Lord may protect us and that peace might prevail in the world. For the first time in years, we will celebrate the Paraklesis service in the evening, rather than in the morning, to enable working people to attend. The services will take place at 7 p.m. on Monday, August 1, Wednesday, August 3, Monday, August 7, Wednesday, August 9, and Friday, August 11. Inasmuch as the Dormition is a most solemn occasion, it is characterized by fasting. For us, fasting is accompanied by more frequent prayer and acts of philanthropy. In terms of food, we eat less, and avoid meat, dairy and fish.

Among Church fathers who have written about the Theotokos, St. Gregory Palamas figures prominently. Mary the Mother of God is the first volume in the series Sermons by Saint Gregory Palamas. We would like to bring the life and teaching of this remarkable 14th century saint (1296-1359) to your attention, and to encourage you to read the above-noted work.

Arranged thematically, the work consists of six sermons devoted to the Mother of God, including Homily 37, which St. Gregory preached on the Dormition. We reprint excerpts of this sermon below. Meanwhile, it was in 1334, while on Mount Athos, in his third year at the hermitage of Saint Sabas, which belongs to the Great Lavra, that Palamas experienced a vision in which he was encouraged to share the wisdom bestowed

upon him from on high. It seemed that he was carrying a vessel overflowing with milk, which subsequently turned into the finest of wines. The wine emitted such a strong fragrance that it brought great joy to his soul. A youth appeared and rebuked him for not sharing the wine with others and for allowing it to go to waste, for this wine, as he explained, was inexhaustible. The angel then warned Gregory, reminding him of the parable of the talents. As he later related to his friend and disciple Dorotheus, Palamas understood this vision to mean that the time would come when he would be called upon to transfer his teaching from the simple plane of the ethical (the milk) to the higher plane of the dogmatic word (the wine), which leads heavenward. Thus, at the age of about 38, Gregory began to write his Encomium for Saint Peter the Athonite, and, at about the same time, he also began to compose his homilies on the Theotokos.

"If 'precious in the sight of the Lord is the death of his saints' (Ps. 116:15), and 'the memory of the just is praised' (Prov. 10:7), how much more fitting is it for us to celebrate with highest honors the memory of the ever-virgin Mother of God, the Holy of Holies, through whom the saints receive their hallowing? That is exactly what we are doing today by commemorating her holy dormition and passing away, through which, having been made a little lower than the angels (cf. Ps. 8:5), she rose incomparably higher than the angels, archangels, and all the heavenly powers above them, because of her nearness to the God of all (cf. Rom. 9:5) and the marvels written of old which were accomplished in her." (On the Dormition)

"Since anything that overshadows something else naturally gives it its own form and character, what came to pass in the Virgin's womb was not just union but the formation, out of both the power of the Most High and her all-holy virgin womb, of the incarnate Word of God...As a result of this, her death, too, was life-giving and led to heavenly, immortal life, and its day of remembrance is a joyful holiday and worldwide festival." (On the Dormition)

"It was right, therefore, that the body which brought forth the Son should be glorified with Him in divine glory, and that the Ark of Christ's holiness should arise with Him Who rose on third day, as the Prophet sang" (cf. Ps. 132:8). (On the Dormition)"

"Just as it was only through her that the son came to us, was seen on earth, and lived among men, after previously being invisible to all, so from now on for endless eternity all progress towards the manifestation of divine light, every revelation of divine mysteries, and all forms of spiritual gifts are beyond everyone's grasp without her." (On the Dormition)

"Of all those on earth she is the glory, of those in heaven the delight, the adornment of all creation. Source, fount and root of ineffable good things, she is the crown and perfection of all the saints." (On the Dormition)

Icon Class Ends

As noted in previous issues of the Herald, a six-day class on iconography (the writing of icons) was conducted in June by Theodoros Papadopoulos, an iconographer from Greece (not the iconographer who will be writing the icons in the new Cathedral; this is George Kordis). Eleven students participated. Shown below are the students at their workstations, and also in a group photo, displaying the icons each one wrote.









Sunday OIKOS Lecture Series News


We began our Lecture series in January this year with a talk by Dr. Katina Kostoulas, a clinical psychologist and member of our Parish Council, and head of OIKOS, on The Role of the Family in the Spiritual Development of Children. Meanwhile, we've met to finalize the program for the year. On Sunday March 12, immediately following church services, we heard from a group of educators, headed by Dr. Barbara Karvelis, on the group's experiences working with Syrian and other refugees in Lesbos Greece. The other members of team, two of whom were present and also spoke, include: Dr. Cecilia Wambach, Dr. Carolie Sly, Michele Cobble, and Lydia Stack. A few months ago, His All Holiness Ecumenical Patriarch Bartholomew visited Lesbos and the refugee camps there, together with Pope Francis and Greek Archbishop Ieronymos. At the conclusion of what was a very moving presentation, Father Stephen expressed that, together with the Philoptochos and other parish groups, such as Young Adults and GOYA, the Cathedral would like to partner with a school on Lesbos, primarily to assist with the procurement of materials and other teaching resources that the schools there would like to have. We are very sensitive to the situation there, in view of the present economy of Greece, and we are not interested in engaging in politics. Just to be of help, as the local authorities decide.

Looking ahead, on June 11 Carl Andrew Wiener will speak to us on a topic of interest. Similarly, Dr. Steven Harris is scheduled to speak to us on October 8. We are also trying to secure Professor George Kordis, the iconographer who will write the icons for our new Cathedral prior to the end of the year, depending upon his travel schedule.

At the same time, we are hoping to self-publish the talks which will have been presented since the inception of the program. In addition to the above, we have had talks on parenting, the Theology of St. Maximos the Confessor, the Prayer Rope, as well as Byzantine Chanting. The lectures are about 20 to 30 minutes long with about 20 minutes for dialogue from the participants with the presenter and each other.

Introduction to Orthodoxy Introduction to Orthodoxy" Class Welcomes New Members to the Faith

The new Annunciation cathedral recalls the beauty and majesty of other churches more than a millennium old, such as Hagia Sophia in Constantinople. Those who have been fortunate enough to witness its construction know that, like those older church-



es, it is being built to last, and one can imagine it serving the needs of the faithful, God willing, centuries from now. The building is an impressive, outward sign of our community's conscious outreach to the city and the world. By building a sanctuary for God, we are simultaneously expressing a gesture of welcome to all future generations of Orthodox Christians.

Some of them will be born into our families, while others will marry into the faith. Still others will come to us simply because they are astounded by the beauty of our worship, the richness of our theological traditions, and our special emphasis on the mystery of our intimate encounter with God. Whether future parishioners are drawn into the fold by love for its members, for their resilient, ancient faith, or by a mixture of the two, we must continue to be prepared to accommodate incoming Orthodox Christians of every background.

The Cathedral's weekly "Introduction to Orthodoxy" class aims to facilitate the spiritual journey of those considering joining our Church. We prepare adult inquirers for their baptisms and chrismations, and we explore the richness of our faith through discussion of Holy Scripture, the theology of the Church Fathers, and the lives of the Saints. The goal of the course is to provide people with acculturation in the Church prior to their becoming full members in it.

I invite all of you to encourage spouses and relatives to visit our class if you think they might want to join the Orthodox Church. But just as importantly, please try to identify new visitors who show an interest in our faith and encourage them to be a part of "Introduction to Orthodoxy." I know from personal experience that Annunciation Cathedral is uncommonly welcoming to outside visitors, and we must all do our part to help people interested in joining us.

Social Justice Committee

Dr. Lingas writes: Hello everyone! My name is Elena O. Lingas, and I am heading up the new social justice committee. Before I discuss the committee, let me take a moment to introduce myself to those who don't know me. I am originally from Portland, Oregon, and many of you know members of my family—my brother, Alexander Lingas, founding director of *Cappella Romana*, and my parents Catherine and John Lingas. Graduate school brought me to the Bay Area, and I am currently a faculty member at a graduate public health program. I live in Berkeley with my husband and son.

One of the most striking things about Jesus' ministry on earth is how fundamentally radical it was: he focused his attention on those who are overlooked, forgotten, ignored. His message was one of love and concern for others, rather than of self-interest. Our parish is already taking many social justice-oriented actions, from the Community Kitchen providing nourishment and fellowship to fellow San Franciscans; to the Community Link, visiting isolated Orthodox Christians; and of course the many philanthropic activities of the Philoptochos. There are multiple ways that we can build upon these existing ministries as well as create new areas of focus. It is really up to the interests and enthusiasms of members of the parish to provide guidance.

As Father Stephen has previously mentioned, we have made connections with the Michael Pappas, Director of the San Francisco Interfaith Council. We are planning a meeting this summer with the Reverend Will Scott, Program Director for California Interfaith Power and Light (CIPL) (http://www.interfaithpower.org/). CIPL can help us think about "greening" our parish and its operations, in keeping with Ecumenical Patriarch Bartholomew's emphasis on protecting the environment. A Word About Stewardship: Continuing Good News

We are pleased to share with you that financial Stewardship pledge income received in 2017, so far, is shaping up to be the highest in recent history. Hopefully, this trend continues throughout 2017. As of June 1, 283 of our 350 Stewardship units (families, for the most part), have sent in their 2017 Stewardship pledge, which totals \$260,968 so far for the support of the Cathedral's ministries. While this amount is essentially only about half of what it takes to keep the Cathedral operating, the level of support is promising. The average pledge amount has increased over recent years and that is a testimony to your commitment. The average pledge amount for 2016 was \$845 (as compared to \$782 in 2013). As of this writing, it is \$922 With this level of support, it looks like we will exceed our Stewardship goal of \$300,000. We thank you for your continued support, your love for the Lord and His people, and your unwavering dedication to the Annunciation Cathedral. God bless you.




