

PASCHA

On the Great and Holy Feast of Pascha, Orthodox Christians celebrate the life-giving Resurrection of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. This feast of feasts is the most significant day in the life of the Church. It is a celebration of the defeat of death, as neither death itself nor the power of the grave could hold our Savior captive. In this victory that came through the Cross, Christ

broke the bondage of sin, and through faith offers us restoration, transformation, and eternal life.

Holy Week comes to an end at sunset of Great and Holy Saturday, as the Church prepares to celebrate her most ancient and preeminent festival, Pascha, the feast of feasts. The time

of preparation will give way to a time of fulfillment. The glorious and resplendent light emanating from the empty Tomb will dispel the darkness. Christ, risen from the dead, cracks the fortress of death and takes "captivity captive" (Psalm 67:19). All the limitations of our createdness are torn asunder. Death is swallowed up in victory and life is liberated. "For as by a man came death, by a man came also the resurrection of the dead. For as in Adam all die, so also in Christ shall all be made alive" (I Corinthians 15:21-22). Pascha is the dawn of the new and unending day. The Resurrection constitutes the most radical and decisive deliverance of humankind.

The Resurrection of Jesus Christ is the fundamental truth and absolute fact of the Christian faith. It is the central experience and essential kerygma of the Church. It confirms the authenticity of Christ's remarkable earthly life and vindicates the truth of His teaching. It seals all His redemptive work: His life, the model of a holy life; His compelling and unique teaching; His extraordinary works; and His awesome, life-creating death. Christ's Resurrection is the guarantee of our salvation. Together with His Ascension it brings to perfection God's union with us for all eternity.

The Resurrection made possible the miracle of the Church, which in every age and generation proclaims and affirms "God's plan for the universe, the ultimate divinization of man and the created order." The profound experience of and the unshakable belief in the risen Lord enabled the Apostles to evangelize the world and empowered the Church to overcome paganism. The Resurrection discloses the indestructible power and inscrutable wisdom of God. It disposes of the illusory myths and belief systems by which people, bereft of divine knowledge, strain to affirm the meaning and purpose of their existence. Christ, risen and glorified, releases humanity from the delusions of idolatry. In Him grave-bound humanity discovers and is filled with incomparable hope. The Resurrection bestows illumination, energizes souls, brings forgiveness, transfigures lifes, creates saints, and gives joy.

The Resurrection has not yet abolished the reality of death. But it has revealed its powerlessness (Hebrews 2:14-15). We continue to die as a result of the Fall. Our bodies decay and fall away. "God allows death to exist but turns it against corruption and its cause, sin, and sets

Elpida Retreat: A Day of Faith, Service, and Community

This year's Elpida Retreat was truly extraordinary, marking the fourth gathering of faith, learning, and service. It was heartening to see the Elpida program continue to grow and flourish, bringing together families from diverse backgrounds, including children from our neighboring Russian and Palestinian Orthodox parishes. This retreat strengthened the fabric of our Orthodox family and expanded our mission, serving as a testament to the power of community. I couldn't be more proud of how far we have come. When Christo Pappademos and I launched the Elpida program in 2021, we had no idea how it would evolve. At the time, the future was uncertain, but today, as I look at what we have built, my heart swells with gratitude. None of this success would be possible without the incredible dedication of our Elpida board. Their vision, commitment, and support have transformed this program into a true family, and I am deeply appreciative of each and every one of them.

A Day of Learning, Service, and Fun

The retreat featured meaningful, hands-on activities that engaged the children and deepened their connection to our Orthodox faith. Each station was thoughtfully designed to teach them about saints and significant moments in the life of the Church. The children's enthusiasm, curiosity, and eagerness to learn were truly inspiring.

One station focused on the life and teachings of St. Gregory Palamas, emphasizing his dedication to prayer and contemplation. As part of this activity, the children made candles, symbolizing the light they can bring to others, just as St. Gregory did. Another station celebrated

St. Modestos, the Greek Orthodox patron saint of animals. Here, the children built birdhouses to honor God's creatures, fostering a spiritual connection with nature. The final station centered on the resurrection of

Lazarus, an event that foreshadows Christ's own resurrection. The children learned about Lazarus' life and death and baked traditional lazarakia, sweet breads symbolizing the story. These activities brought our faith to life and provided a memorable learning experience for all.

This year's service project was particularly meaningful as we partnered with the San Francisco Fire Department to create blankets for those in need. Thanks to Captain Dustin Novo and his team, the children were able to give back to the community in a tangible way. It was humbling to witness their eagerness to help others, knowing their efforts would have a direct impact on those most in need. To make the experience even more special, Captain Novo and his team brought their fire engine to be blessed by Father Angelo. This moment reminded us of the many ways we can serve and protect our communities.



Honoring a Legacy of Service: The Tony and Helen Sooklaris Scholarship

The retreat also featured the presentation of the Tony and Helen Sooklaris Scholarship, established in loving memory of John Sooklaris' parents. This scholarship honors individuals who exemplify service, leadership, and dedication to our community—values that Tony and Helen embodied throughout their lives.

Tony and Helen Sooklaris were pillars of the Annunciation community, leaving an indelible mark through their generosity, leadership, and unwavering commitment to their faith and heritage. Married for 59 years, they worked side by side in business and service, embodying the values of hard work, family, and community.

Tony, a World War II veteran, entrepreneur, and inventor, was known for his brilliant mind, generosity, and storytelling. He co-founded Masterpiece Artist Canvas, revolutionizing the art supply industry, and was a dedicated leader in the Greek Orthodox Annunciation Cathedral and the Pan-



Cretan Association of America. Helen, a talented violinist in her youth, was a tireless advocate for her Cretan heritage, serving as a leader in the Pancretan Association's Ariadne Chapter for over 30 years. Her legendary Cretan pilafi was a staple at Greek festivals, bringing people together in celebration.

This year's recipient, Nikolaos "Niko" Mastrokyriakos, is a truly deserving honoree, embodying the values of service, leadership, and faith. An active participant in the Elpida program since its inception, Niko has demonstrated unwavering dedication to his church and community. His involvement in Jr. GOYA, the altar, Greek dance, community kitchen, and church basketball highlights his deep commitment to both his faith and heritage. His kindness, leadership, and compassion set him apart, and his strong moral character and dedication to giving back ensure that the legacy of Tony and Helen Sooklaris continues to inspire future generations. 


Upcoming Events

Epitaphios Flowers


